

+ Fast Facts on American Marriages



In 2023 there were about 2.4 million new marriages with more than 1.8 million being first marriages in the United States (FP-24-25, FP-25-01).




With 31.5 women marrying per 1,000 unmarried women, the U.S. refined marriage rate remained stable between 2022 and 2023 and has returned to 2018 levels (FP-24-25).



The age at first marriage continues to rise and remains higher among men than women. Among individuals entering a first marriage in 2022, the median age for women was 28.6 and for men was 30.5 (<u>FP-24-08</u>). The median age at remarriage was 48 for men and 44 for women in 2019 (<u>FP-21-18</u>).




In 2023, the marriage-to-divorce ratio was 2.38. This means that there were about two marriages for every divorce in 2023 (FP-24-27).



In 2019, 50% of adults over age 50 were married. Further, 59% of older adults who were married were in their first marriages (FP-22-16).



About 3.6% of all marriages in 2021 were among same-sex couples, amounting to 60,046 marriages (FP-23-09).



In 2023, the remarriage rate was higher for men than women (34.4 per 1,00 for men and 18.5 per 1,000 for women) (FP-23-09).



Roughly 76% of women lived with their spouse prior to getting married (FP-21-04).



Most different-sex couples (65%) and same-sex couples (69%) who married in 2021 entered a first marriage (FP-23-09).



Seven out of ten high school seniors in 2020 expected to marry in the future. Nearly one-fourth (23%) did not know if they expected to marry (FP-22-04).
