Title: Operator Theory of Resistance Networks

Abstract: We study resistance networks using the Hilbert spaces of functions defined on them: \$\mathcal{H}_{\mathcal{E}}\$ and \$\mathcal{H}_D\$. We examine currents, potential functions, and functions defined via the discrete Laplacian—dipoles, monopoles, and harmonic functions—alongside their probabilistic interpretations in terms of transience and recurrence. Our discussion is based on *Operator Theory and Analysis of Infinite Networks* by Jorgensen and Pearse.

Title: A Hidden Markov Model (HMM) Approach to Authorship Attribution of Disputed New Testament Books

Abstract: Many New Testament scholars have doubted that the Apostle Paul wrote all the letters attributed to him in the Christian New Testament. Three books in particular—1 Timothy, 2 Timothy, and Titus—have drawn the most criticism over the past century on account of their having a so-called "non-Pauline style". When a Hidden Markov Model is applied to the parts-of-speech tags in the Greek text, we can better classify what is a "Pauline" and "non-Pauline" style and show whether these books were written by the Apostle Paul.
